The LMID county profile also lists data for Employment by Industry, Occupations with the Fastest Growth, High Wage Occupations, Economic Indicators, Population/Census Data, and Resources for Job Openings and Training Providers.

Under Occupations with Fastest Growth Rate, there is a one page 2006-2016 Projections Highlights of Employment by Industry Sector (Attachment 1). According to this document, occupational projections for period 2006-2016 forecast:

- About 227,500 new jobs from industry growth,
- Estimated 315,500 job openings from Net Replacements, and
- A combined total of 543,000 job openings.
- Riverside and San Bernardino counties constitute about 8.5 percent of California's total nonfarm employment and will contribute about 9.2 percent of the state's nonfarm employment growth during this period. Almost 62 percent of the new jobs will occur in these four industry sectors: Government, Leisure and Hospitality, Professional and Business Services, and Education Services, Health Care and Social Assistance.

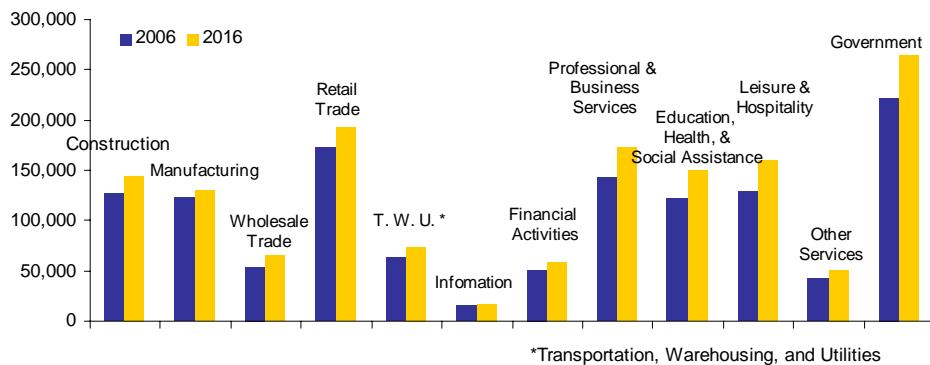

2006 – 2016 Riverside and San Bernardino Counties Projection Highlights

Industry projections forecast total employment, including Self-Employment, Unpaid Family Workers, Private Household Workers, Farm and Nonfarm employment to reach just under 1.65 million in Riverside and San Bernardino Counties. This increase represents a gain of 227,500 jobs for an annual growth rate of 1.6 percent. This rate is slightly above the growth rate for California as a whole, which is estimated at 1.5 percent annually for the same time period.

Riverside and San Bernardino counties constitute about 8.5 percent of California's total nonfarm employment and will contribute about 9.2 percent of the state's nonfarm employment growth during this period. Almost 62 percent of the new jobs will occur in these four industry sectors: Government, Leisure and Hospitality, Professional and Business Services, and Education Services, Health Care and Social Assistance.

2006-2016 Industry Sector Employment Levels



The fastest growing nonfarm industry sector, based on the annual average percentage growth rate, is Leisure and Hospitality which is expected to grow at 2.5 percent per year. Average annual growth rates in Education Services, Health Care and Social Assistance (2.3 percent), Professional and Business Services (2.2 percent), Wholesale Trade (2.1 percent), Other Services (2.1 percent), Government (1.9 percent), and Transportation, Warehousing and Utilities (1.6 percent) will exceed the 1.5 percent annual growth rate for all nonfarm employment in the county.

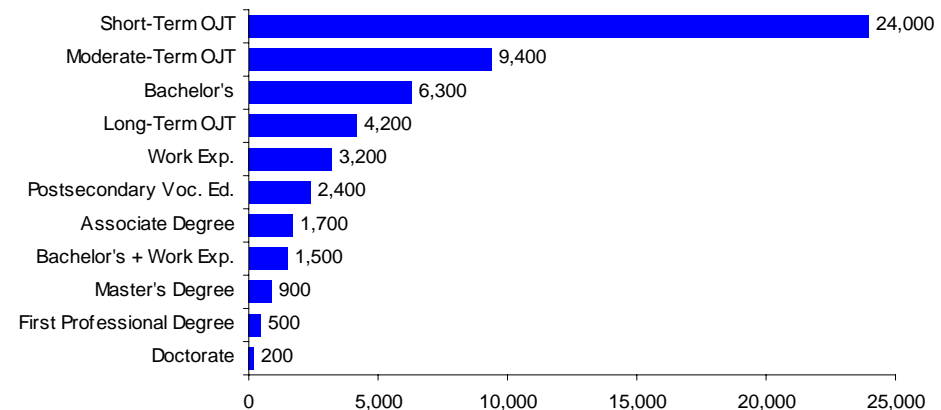
Occupational projections for the period 2006 to 2016 forecast:

- Approximately 227,500 new jobs from industry growth,
- An estimated 315,500 job openings from Net Replacements,
- A combined total of about 543,000 job openings.

The 50 occupations with the most job openings are forecasted to generate about 312,000 job openings, approximately 57 percent of all job openings in Riverside and San Bernardino Counties. The majority of these occupations require only short-term on-the-job training and have median hourly wages ranging from \$8 to \$14. Examples of these occupations are Retail Salespersons and Cashiers. Higher skilled occupations, requiring an associate degree or higher, are also among the 50 with the most openings. Examples of these occupations are Elementary School Teachers and Registered Nurses with median annual salaries of \$62,349 and \$73,444, respectively.

The 50 fastest growing occupations are expected to have an annual growth rate of 2.7 percent or more. The majority of these occupations require a bachelor's degree or higher. Network Systems and Data Communications Analysts is the fastest growing occupation, with a median annual salary of \$59,570 and requires a bachelor's degree. Jobs requiring only on-the-job training are also among the fastest growing, such as Industrial Machinery Mechanics and Combined Food Preparation and Serving Workers, including Fast Food, with median hourly wages spanning from \$8 to \$22.
